of furniture. We only get men's furniture  
& I am trying to make it a bit more  
homelike. It is a very large house  
& it is going to take some doing to get

Howard out here I'm sure he will feel  
better but he still has a lot of work  
to finish in London, he gets very tired

I suffer a great deal at times, I get very worried. Haven't had a chance to get in touch with Helen yet, the weather has been appalling & Howard busy & so far haven't been out on my own yet.

Just quietly I have been terrified of these V2s. I think the people here are marvellous. I have been very lucky having a car to get around in & have seen quite a lot of London, of course I am seeing it at its worst, it is terribly dingy, I am looking forward to seeing it properly in the Spring.

I miss Mary & Jeremy very much as you can imagine but this is certainly no place for them. Do give my love to Rita, Nella & Freda etc I miss you all.

I think I will like living in Dover the town itself has just about been shelled & pierced, hardly a shop with a window in it but everyone quite cheerful & carrying on under most trying difficulties. I would like to tell you a lot of things about the camp etc but cannot.
