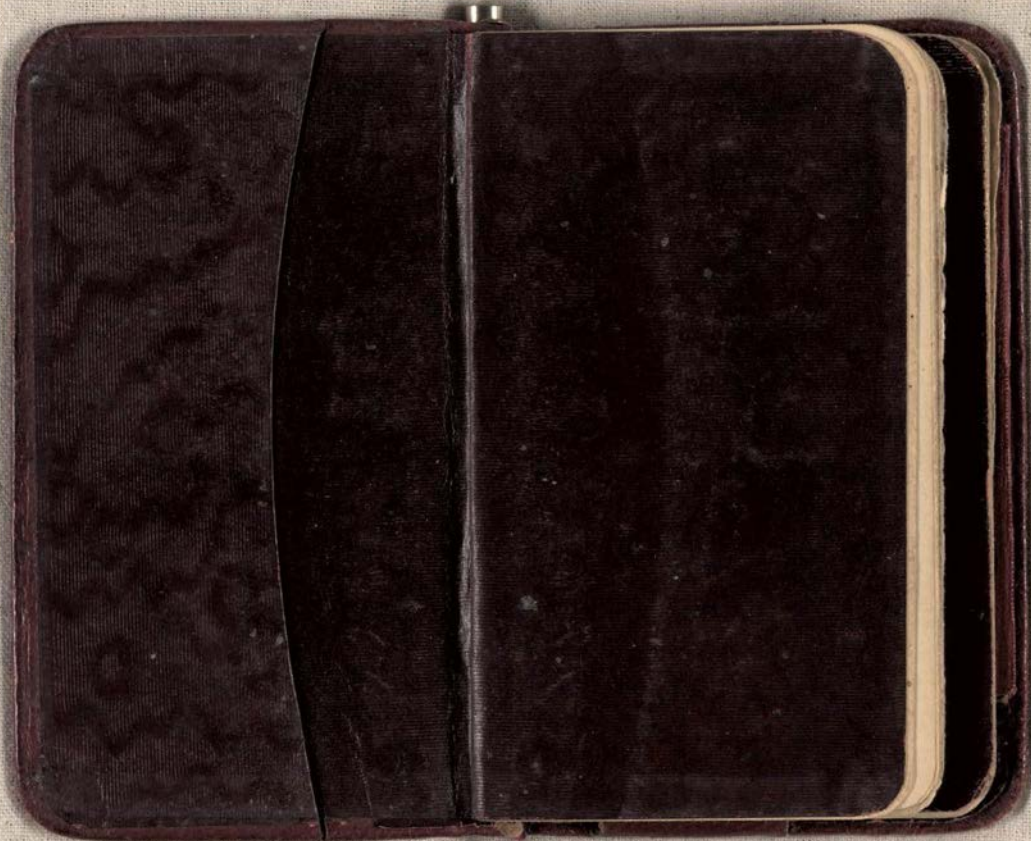

NEW SOUTH WALES.

INCOME TAX.

Under the Income Tax Act, 1912, the rates payable are as follows:—

In the case of all persons (other than companies) on incomes exceeding £300 and not exceeding £700 per annum, 6d. in the £.

There is an addition of one-third in each of the above rates if the person is an absentee, and a further addition of one-third on such part of income as is derived from income from property.

LAND TAX.

The land tax is levied on the unimproved value at the rate of 1d. in the £. A sum of £240 is allowed by way of exemption, and where the unimproved value is in excess of that sum a reduction equal to the exemption is made, but where several blocks of land are held within the State, only one amount of £240 may be deducted from the aggregate.

VICTORIA.

INCOME TAX.

 For Companies (other than Life Assurance Companies), for every £, 1s.

No exemption allowed to Companies.

Incomes between £200 and £500 are allowed an exemption of £150; those above £500 paying full tax.

For Life Assurance Companies, for every £, 8d. in the £.

For Owners or Charterers of Ships whose principal place of Business is out of Victoria, a tax assessed on £5 in every £100 of amount payable to him for carriage of passengers, live stock, mails, or goods shipped in Victoria.

LAND TAX.

The Land Tax of 1910, which repealed the Act of 1890, now governs the taxation of land in Victoria. Under this Act a Tax is levied on all land whose unimproved value exceeds £250. As the unimproved value rises above £250 the exemption diminishes at the rate of £1 for every £1 of excess, so as to leave no exemption at £500. There is a uniform rate of 4d. per £ of unimproved value, and no amount less than two shillings and sixpence is collected.

QUEENSLAND.

WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

INCOME TAX.

The rates of Income Tax in the £ on the taxable income remaining after allowing all deductions claimable are:—£1 to £500, 4d.; £501 to £750, 5d.; £751 to £1,000, 6d.; £1,001 to £1,500, 7d.; £1,501 to £2,000, 8d.; £2,001 to £3,000, 9d.; £3,001 to £4,000, 10d.; £4,001 to £5,000, 11d.; £5,001 and over, 1s. An additional 50 per cent. is payable by absentees.

Under the "Dividend Duties Act 1902," every Company carrying on business in Western Australia is required to pay a duty of 1s. in the £ on all dividends declared.

LAND TAX.

The rates of Land Tax are as follows:—4d. in the £ on the unimproved value of land which is improved within the meaning of the Act, and 1d. in the £ on

the unimproved value of all other land. If the taxpayer was absent from the Commonwealth during the whole of 1915 (and not absent on the public service), the rates are $\frac{1}{4}$ d. and $\frac{1}{4}$ d. in the £ respectively.

TASMANIA.

INCOME TAX.

Incomes liable.—All incomes arising, accruing, received in or derived from Tasmania, with certain exemptions as specified in the Act.

Income of any Company, rate 1s. in the £ of Taxable amount. Income from lottery prizes, authorised by law in Tasmania, 1s. 6d. in the £. Incomes derived from property, at the rates as follows:—Under £250, 8d. in the £; between £250 and £400, 8d. on the first £250 and 10d. on remainder; £400 and over, 8d. on the first £250, 10d. on next £150, and 1s. on remainder.

In the case of income derived from personal exertion, the scale is as follows:—Under £150, 3d.; between £150 and £250, 4d.; between £250 and £350, 4½d.; between £350 and £400, 5½d.; between £400 and £700, 5½d. on first £400 and 5½d. on the remainder; between £700 and £900, 5½d. on first £400, 6½d. on next £200, and 7½d. on remainder; between £900 and £1,000, 5½d. on first £400, 6½d. on next £200, 7½d. on next £200, and 9½d. on remainder; between £1,000 and £1,500, 5½d. on first £400, 6½d. on next £200, 7½d. on next £200, 9½d. on next £200 and 11½d. on the remainder; between £1,500 and £2,000, 5½d. on the first £400, 6½d. on the next £200, 7½d. on the next £200, 9½d. on the next £200, 11½d. on the next £200 and 1s. 1d. on the remainder; £2,000 and over, 5½d. on the first £400, 6½d. on the next £200, 7½d. on the next £200, 9½d. on the next £200, 11½d. on the next £200, 1s. 1d. on the next £500 and 1s. 3d. on the remainder.

Deductions.—Where Taxable amount from all sources is under £400 deductions as follows:—Between £100 and £110, deduction £70; between £110 and £125, deduction £60; between £125 and £150, deduction £50; between £150 and £250, deduction £40; between £250 and £350, deduction

£30; between £350 and £400, deduction £20. A deduction of 2s. 6d. on tax payable, for each child under 16, on incomes under £350 is allowed.

Exemptions.—Any married person (or widower or widow, having a child under 16 dependent upon him or her) whose net income during the year preceding the year of assessment was under £125, and any unmarried person whose income was under £100.

LAND TAX.

The Land Tax and Income Tax Act of 1910 governs this form of taxation in Tasmania. According to it a land owner pays in respect of every pound sterling of unimproved value according to the following scale:—

When the Total unimproved value is less than £2,500, 1d. in the pound is payable; £2,500 and up to £5,000, 1½d.; £5,000 and up to £15,000, 1½d.; £15,000 and up to £30,000, 1½d.; £30,000 and up to £50,000, 2d.; £50,000 and up to £80,000, 2½d.; over £80,000, 2½d. in the £.

NEW ZEALAND.

INCOME TAX.

Persons and Firms.—Exemption, £300; under £400, taxable balance 6d. in the £; £400 to £600, taxable balance 7d. in the £; £600 to £700, taxable balance, 8d. in the £; £700 to £800, taxable balance, 9d. in the £; £800 to £900, taxable balance, 10d. in the £; £900 to £1,000, taxable balance, 11d. in the £; £1,000 to £1,250, taxable balance 1s. in the £; £1,250 to £2,000, taxable balance, 1s. 1d. in the £; over £2,000, taxable balance, 1s. 4d. in the £.

Companies.—No exemption; under £250, taxable balance 1s. in the £; £1,250 to £2,000, 1s. 1d. in the £; over £2,000, 1s. 4d. in the £.

LAND TAX.

Ordinary tax (on unimproved value), 1d. in the £.

Graduated tax (in addition to ordinary), 1/15d. in the £ to 1/2 per cent.

Mortgages (on capital value) ½d. in the £.

FEDERAL LAND TAX.

The tax is upon unimproved value of land throughout the Commonwealth. In the case of residents in the Commonwealth, the tax is as follows:—

Under £5,000—unimproved value—Exempt.

INCREASE OF RATE OF TAX.

Moved by the financial needs of Australia, arising from war conditions; the Parliament passed into law a measure increasing the rate of Land Tax applicable to estates already in the taxable field,

The original measure provided for a gradually ascending scale beginning at 1d. in the £ on the first £1 in excess of £5,000 unimproved value, and thereafter increasing by 1/30,000th of 1d. for each £1 of value up to £75,000, when the average rate over the whole estate became 3d., and the rate on any excess over £75,000 became a flat rate of 6d. in the £.

Under the new scale the rate of acceleration was increased from 1/30,000th of 1d. to 1/18,750th of 1d. for each successive £1 of value, and after £75,000, when an average rate of 5d. in the £1 over the whole estate was reached, a flat rate of 9d. in the £1 applied to the excess value over £75,000. The change of scale has resulted in an additional revenue of £446,100 for the financial year 1914-15.

ABSENTEES.

All Australian land-owners who leave Australia to participate in the war are being treated as residents entitled to the general exemption of £5,000 provided for resident owners and to assessment at the lower rate of tax applicable to such persons.

Where land is owned in more than one State, returns should be sent to the Federal Commissioner of Land, "Rialto," Melbourne. Where owned in one State only, to the Deputy Commissioner of Land Tax for the State in which the land is situated

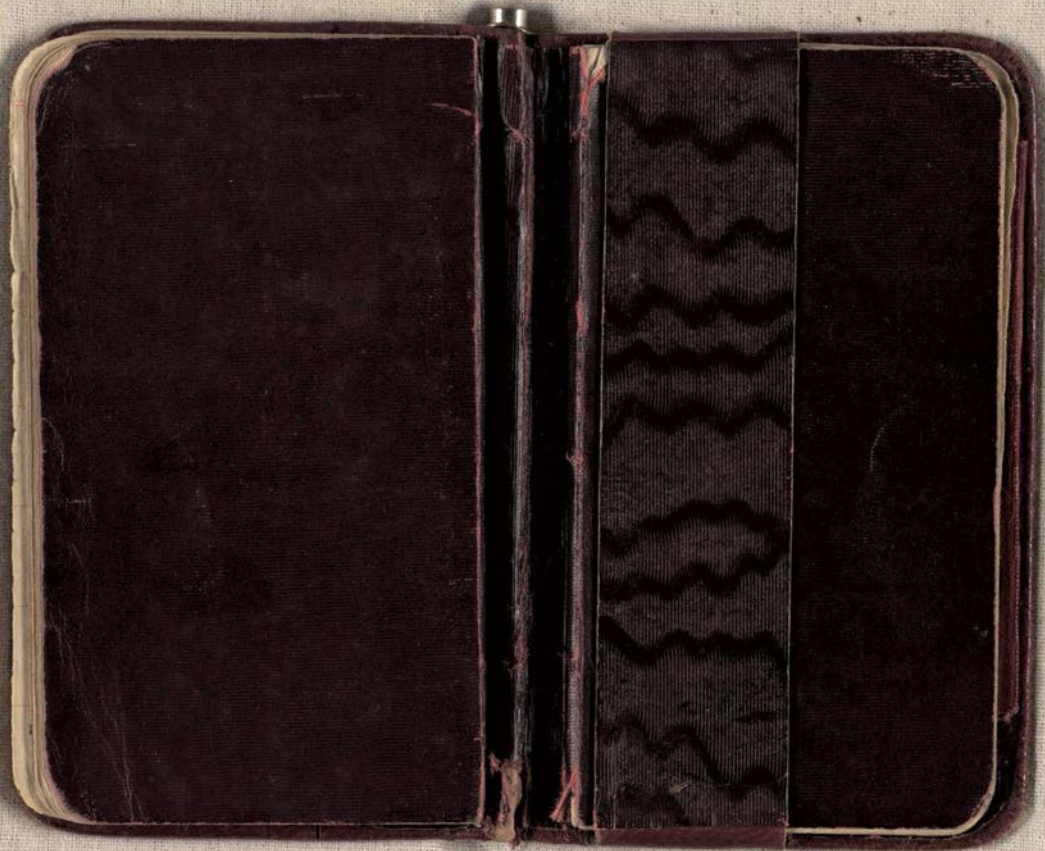

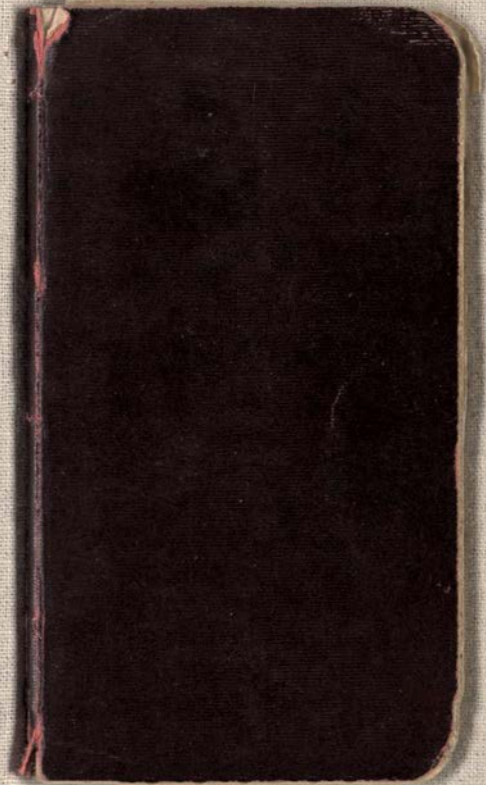

May 10th. Left Sydney
12:30 with three Australian
transports the "Port Sydney",

There was an Australian
destroyer with us also
the "Encounter". It is a
lovely night. We headed
for New Zealand at
first, but I think
we have changed our
course and are now
steering south. The
"Turakina" and "Tofua"
are with us.

May 11th. It is a fine sight
this morning to see the
eight ships in two lines
with four in each line.
In one line there is the
"Marathon", "Turakina",

Iofua and the destroyer.
The other line is the
"Encounter", "Port Sydney"
"Ulysses" and "the Paketa".
May 12th. 6 o'clock in the
morning we passed 4 of 5
islands. At 8 o'clock we
passed some more
small islands. At
night we could see
a searchlight working.
It is very likely from
a Japanese cruiser out
scouting, as there was
one in Sydney when
we left. May 13th Sunday.
Littell's will be 13 months
old to day. What che? We
are having a good ride
for our money to day
as the sea is pretty

rough. There has been
another lot of transports
and convoys caught up
to us from Melbourne
which brings our total
up to about 15 ships
altogether. This morning
a sailing ship passed
us. Just now all the
mess dishes went flying
off the table through
the boat rolling.
May 14th. It is still
rough and cold to day.
May 15th. We were lucky
in getting our breakfast
this morning as the cooks
have gone on strike for
more wages. I hear now
that they got 14 days
C.B. and 28 days pay stopped

I think we are going to Fremantle instead of Albany. It is still cold and rough. One of the boats with us has munition workers on board (the Suffolk)

May 16th. To-day I got a good view of all the ships with us. There are 10 others besides ourselves and the Encounter. The two destroyers (there was one with the transports from Melbourne) had to put back as the seas was too rough for them. This was a day or two ago. We had our identification discs issued to us to-day

May 17th. Nothing of importance to-day only rough seas and a cold wind.

May 18th. Ditto

May 19th. One of the destroyers has caught up to us again. ~~It is~~

May 20th. This morning there is another war-ship with us.

May 21st. Six o'clock we got a glimpse of Western Australia

10 o'clock anchored outside the harbour at Fremantle

May 22nd. Saw either a seal or else a sea lion near the boat. Went along side wharf at 12 o'clock and

left again at 4 o'clock.
Left Fremantle at 11 o'clock
May 23. Nothing of importance
today, only very hot
weather. In the afternoon
we had a dummy
submarine alarm and
there was a great
scramble.

May 24. This afternoon
all the boats stopped
for about an hour and
a half. Some of our
sailors went to the
other boats on a small
boat but returned again

June 4th. We had a half holiday
today for the birth of
June 5th. I've been watching
the flying fish this
morning. They fly over the
yard about the size
of a herring.

About 11 o'clock sighted
Mauritius, which is
an island belonging to
England. The H.M. Store
left us and her place
was taken by two
Japanese cruisers.
We didn't go into the
port which is Port
Louis but were
picked up by the war-
ships outside.
Mauritius is 405 square miles in
size and is a great
sugar growing place.

June 6. Saw another
small island this morning.
June 7. Nothing of importance
to-day only hot weather.
Wrote letters to-day.

June 8th. Struck a bit
of a storm and it's a
very stormy night.

June 9th. A chap on the
"Sharpshire" died to-day.
He was boating and was
either knocked down or
else slipped, anyhow
he struck his head and
got concussion.

June 10. Another burial
at sea, posted parcel.
June 11th. The weather
is better again.

June 12. 6 o'clock sighted
Africa, anchored inside
the harbor ^{our boat} of demerine.
We are going to a Japanese
owner. To eat ashore
at night.

June 13th. Went into
town again to-day.
The trams are full
and the baths and
pictures. Went to
Zoo at Mitchell Park
and down to the
beach. At night
we went in tram
to a place called
Superport. There's
plenty of oranges
here but other
fruit is dear
enough. The
Baterley is here
with British troops
for German East Africa.
Went to museum
and saw a German
flag hauled down

Botha
by General ~~Jan~~
is East Africa, also
part of first railway
lines fixed in office.
June 14th. Town again.
Went to Bulwer Park
picked an orange and
some cotton.
June 15th. Went to
Zambeni Protestant School
June 16. Visited Hindu
quarters and Hindu temple.
There are ~~some~~ British
troops here besides
Australians and N. Z.
Had a look round the
Zulu places just near
the boat.
June 17th. Left Durban at
half-past twelve.
Rough night and a lot of
deck fittings forward
blown away.

June 18th. Going south to
Cape Town. A very rough
day.

June 19th. It is still rough.
The Turakina and Iofaa
went on to Cape Town
last Friday. There
were two other boats
with us and a Jap.
cruiser. Last night
we got away from
the other two and
this morning the
cruiser went back
to pick them up.
Tonight there is no sign
of any of them.

June 20th. Nice weather
no sign of other boats.

June 21st. Sighted land
again. Saw a whale
spouting this afternoon.
We are still on our
own. Got to Cape Town
at 11 P.M.

June 22nd. Cape Town.
The Turakina and Iofaa
and some Australian
transports left Durban
on the 15 June. They
left here this morning.
The Jap cruiser and the
other boats that got
left behind arrived this
morning. We had to
get rid of 100 tons of
water for safety during
the rough weather we
had. The chaps are
catching plenty of fish
from the boat.

Went into the town on
leave. It's a nice place
but the streets are
very narrow.

June 23rd. Leave from
10 o'clock. Went on train
around mountain to
Camp Bay. Back again
via Clifton and Sea
Point. Gardens and
Museum and Market
Place. Sent views.

June 24th. Leave again
I just knocked about
town. Sent letter.

June 25th. Our ship went
out into the stream at
10 o'clock. The H. M. S. Britannia
arrived from Simon Town.

June 26th Left Cape Town
11 o'clock.

There are seven other
boats besides ourselves
and the H. M. S. Britannia
June 27th Nothing of importance

June 28th. Nice weather.
Boat stations at night.

June 29th. Nothing interesting

June 30th. Sports again
to-day. Burial of the chess
boat stations.

July 1st. They are putting up
the awnings, so we must
be going to have some hot
weather.

July 3rd. Saw some more
flying-fish this afternoon

July 4th. Weather getting
very hot now. Saw a
total eclipse of the moon

July 5th Washing day.

July 6th Smooth sea
and very hot weather.

July 7th. Crossed the
Line to-day at
10 o'clock.

~~July 8th~~ Sent 12 and 13th
Glosser. All the boats
had big gun practice.

July 8th Weather still
very hot.

July 9th Physical drill
competition. Heavy 1st
Specs 2nd of egg 3rd one

July 10th Reached Sierra
Leone, anchored at
4 o'clock.

July 11th Still in harbor
no leave.

July 12th very hot.

July 13th Another hospital ship
the Keroola came in to-day
a concert party from
Mabono came on board
this afternoon. There are 2
or 3 captured boats here.
One is on a reef just
outside.

July 14th Left Sierra
Leone at 12.30.

There are eight boats
and H. M. S. King Alfred.

July 15th Rained all day.

July 16th Still raining.

Spiced a small steamer.

July 17th Washing day and
the hottest day we've
had yet.

July 18th A cricket match
to-day between officers
and men and in the
middle of it the
Alarm went.

Result of patrol not known

July 19th Today the Suffolk put back to a port we have just passed I think it is D'ace.

July 20th. all the ships zig-zag now as we are in danger zone.

July 21st Reports again today. Fine weather and smooth sea.

July 22 Sports, saw 4 steamers, Chap fell down hold.

July 23rd Had photo taken

July 24th Washing day

July 25th We have to wear lifebelts all the time now. Two boats in sight

July 26th. There are seven or eight destroyers with us now.

July 27th Things are exciting this morning as one of the destroyers fired four shots at a submarine. Saw a sea-plane a long way off. Lighted land 3000 ft. Dropped anchor at seaport, Plymouth Sound.

July 28th. Landed at Plymouth at 1-15 left for Kingscote, Buffalo arrived 10-30.

July 29th. Sent 15 letters I got our first mail

July 30th Medical
Examination.

July 31th. Wrote 16th
letters.

Aug 5 Sent No 1.
Went to Figheldean

Aug 12th Went to
amesbury and Stone-
henge.

Aug 16th Sent No 2.

Aug 15. Shifted camp
to Lidworth

to No 18.

Aug 19th Went to Lidworth

train at 6.30 in the
morning arrived at

Hazelbrouk at 4 o'clock

hay loft.

into Hazelbrouk.

Oct 5th marched to
Morbecque and

Steenbecque to
have a bath. When we
got there the bath was
off, but we got it
on the way back as
it rained very heavy.

Oct 7th Left Haagehoek
at 2.30 and left the
station 20 past four.

Got to billets in
Poperinghe at 7.30

Oct 8th. Left poperinghe
8.30 and marched to

Red Rose camp arriving
at half past two. This camp
is about half way to Ypres
from Poperinghe

Oct 9th. Left camp 8.30
passed ypres 10.30

Camped for the night
While we were having
dinner two shells fell
in the paddock followe
up by several more in
the afternoon.

October 10th. Henry and I
were attached to 3rd
Machine Gun Compny, at 5
o'clock at night we went out
with the company as carriers
with about 10 more men
from the Brigade, Carried
ammunition out to positions
and got back to camp about
9.30. Our Battalion the
4th together with the 2nd
went into the trenches
and we passed them as
we were coming back
wounded - 12.10.17
Died - 14.10.17

May 13/5/17

It was a ^{sunday} Sunday
today that indeed
cold and rough
worst day yet.
